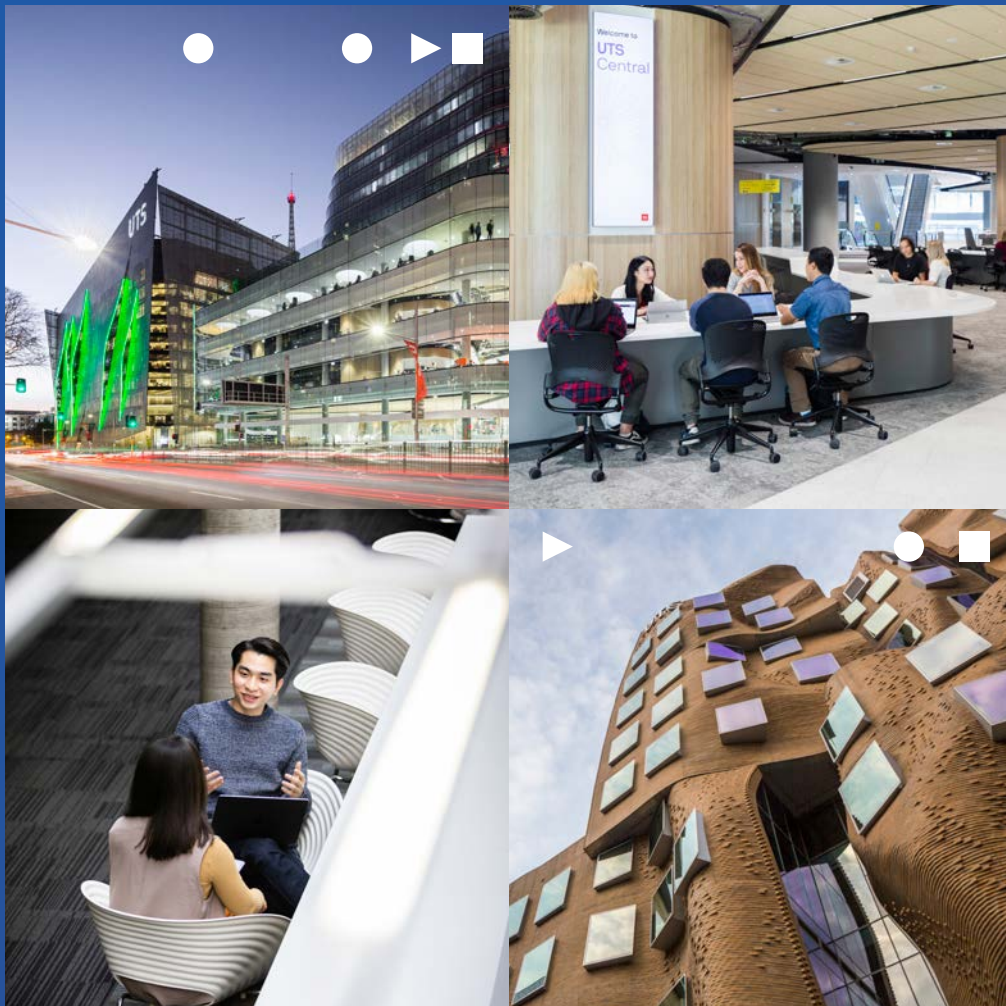
1.1 Cambridge International AS and A Levels

1.4 Accommodation for Under-18 students

International students who are under 18 years must reside in accommodation approved by the Department of Home Affairs, or UTS College approved accommodation and welfare arrangements.

If an international student's parent, legal custodian, or eligible relative wishes to care for them in Australia, they must apply to be the student's nominated guardian through the [Department of Home Affairs](#).

UTS College approves three accommodation types outlined below. More details on accommodation options and application instructions are available in our [Under 18 information guide](#) and on our [website](#).

Homestay

Living with a local family is a great way for you to experience life in Australia and practise your spoken English. All our homestays have been specially chosen to ensure that you are provided with a safe and supportive home environment. Each home is within 45 to 60 minutes travelling time from the campus, in a variety of locations around Sydney. This is a fantastic opportunity to live like a local and have an authentic Australian lifestyle experience.

Student residential accommodation

Each student residential building is purpose-built and features ultra-modern facilities including study areas, collaboration zones, and social spaces to connect with friends. Providing all the comforts of home in a safe, community-style setting, student residential buildings have everything you need at your fingertips. If it is your first time living away from home, you can be confident you are on track to a great student lifestyle experience while you study at UTS College.

Special host

If you want to live with a close family friend or a family member that does not meet the definition of an eligible relative by the [Department of Home Affairs](#), the family friend or family member will need to apply to be a Special Host under UTS College Homestay arrangements. Canvas is UTS College's Learning Management System (LMS). It's where you'll access your program materials and where your teachers will contact you.

Log in to Canvas by entering your UTS email address and password. Once you're in, we recommend you complete some Canvas activities to help you prepare for your program.

3. Download Microsoft Office onto your personal device

4. Upload your photo for your student ID card

You'll receive an email advising if your photo has been 'approved' or 'rejected'. After your photo has been approved, the Student Centre will notify you when your ID card is ready for collection at the Student Centre (Building 5, Block C, Level 1. See our [campus map](#) for details).

Welcome Week activities

Welcome Week activities are orientation and preparation activities for your first academic semester (summer semester) at UTS College. It's an exciting time because you'll find out everything you need to know to get started in your course and set yourself up for success.

Attendance at Welcome Week is mandatory, and it's a lot of fun. You'll be introduced to UTS College by the Principal of the program and attend workshops to discuss your course goals and objectives. These are opportunities to find out what is expected of you and what you can expect from your program. You'll take part in:

- introductory sessions about the learning outcomes of all your subjects
- meetings to form learning groups within your subjects. These are a chance to get to know your classmates and teachers through fun and practical activities.
- study success sessions where your teachers will help you prepare for your studies. Sessions include information about:
 - developing your learning skills while studying at UTS College, including our Learning.Connected approach to teaching and learning
 - preparing for your classes, the types of assessments you'll complete, and the support available to you.

During Welcome Week, you'll learn about UTS College's wide range of support services. These include a learning support program, peer mentoring program, Student Success Advisers, special needs, special consideration, wellbeing, UTS counselling, and UTS medical services.

Additionally, at the end of the semester 1 Welcome Week in February, you can join your classmates and other new students for a fun Welcome to Campus Fair, filled with games, activities, performances, food, prizes and opportunities to join ActivateUTS clubs and societies.



1.6 Compulsory pre-departure induction sessions

A pre-departure induction session is part of the College's support program for students under 18 years old, as well as their parents. The induction is an excellent opportunity for you and your parents to meet and hear directly from the College's Student Success Advisers about important information relevant to you, including our comprehensive support services.

The induction covers the following topics, with a focus on under-18 student matters:

- Re-enrolment - is when you're continuing your Cambridge International AS and A Levels program and selecting your subjects for the next semester. You re-enrol after you've completed your first semester and progress to any subsequent semesters.

Subject descriptions

Cambridge International AS/ A Level subjects

ACC100/101/102/200/201/202 Accounting

Accounting engages you with the relevance and applicability of accounting in real-world contexts and encourages interest in the role and responsibilities of the accountant. Studying this subject helps you to understand, apply, analyse and evaluate accounting information to aid decision-making in business and communicate information to stakeholders. These transferable skills are an ideal foundation for further study and for a future career within accounting or related professions.

ACSC100/101/102/200/201/202 Computer Science

Computer Science encourages you to meet the needs of higher education courses in computer science as well as 21st century digital employers. It encourages you to think creatively, through applying practical programming solutions, and to demonstrate that you are an effective user of technology.

AECO100/101/102/200/201/202 Economics

Economics provides you with the skills needed to use economics in work or further study, including how to explain and analyse economic issues and arguments, evaluate economic information, and organise, present and communicate ideas and judgements clearly.

AMAT100/101/102/200/201/202 Mathematics

Mathematics develops a set of transferable skills. These include the skill of working with mathematical information, and the ability to think logically and independently, consider accuracy, model situations mathematically, analyse results and reflect on findings. You can apply these skills across a wide range of subjects, which will equip you well for progression to higher education or directly into employment.

APHY100/101/102/200/201/202 Physics

Physics develops a set of transferable skills including handling data, practical problem-solving, and applying the scientific method. You will develop relevant attitudes, such as concern for accuracy and precision, objectivity, integrity, enquiry, initiative and inventiveness. You will acquire the essential scientific skills required for progression to further studies or employment.

Academic English subjects

AFFE101/102/201/202 Foundation English

This subject is designed for students entering the program with an IELTS of 5.5. The subject aims to develop your reading, writing, listening, and speaking skills in English, in preparation for further studies at UTS.

Extracurricular activity

ADUK100/101/102/103/200/201/202/203 Duke of Edinburgh's International Award

Duke of Edinburgh's International Award is a leading structured (non-formal education) youth development program, empowering young people in Australia aged 14 to 24 years to explore their full potential and find their purpose, passion and place in the world, regardless of location or circumstance. The Award is a fully inclusive program and has no social, political, or religious affiliations. To achieve an Award in this program, you must learn a skill, improve your physical wellbeing, volunteer in the community and experience a team adventure in a new environment.

First-year university (diploma) subjects

BACC103 Accounting and Accountability

The subject provides you with a user perspective on accounting information, focusing on the types of accountability that most business students use in their professional careers. Through the lens of accountability, this subject emphasises the key role of accounting in decision-making in business and society. You will use spreadsheet software (Excel) to analyse financial reporting and internal business decision-making. You are introduced to legal principles and rules related to the use of accounting information. You also have opportunities to develop your English language proficiency.

BACC203 **Accounting, Business and Society**

This subject provides you with the preparer perspective of accounting information and develops your critical understanding of business issues underpinning the demand for financial and management accounting information. You'll prepare accounting information for various organisational forms using contemporary analytical tools, including excel and practical accounting software, which require the use of technical skills. The implications of accounting issues are also discussed with an emphasis on ethical decision-making by preparers who need to balance the economic objectives of the primary users of accounting information, while also considering broader legal, social and environmental issues.

BECO203 **Economics for Business**

This subject introduces you to the basic concepts, theories, and principles of economics, and requires you to apply these concepts to both real and hypothetical business situations. The subject provides you with the opportunity to understand the broad economic contexts in which businesses operate, and to analyse contemporary economic issues and events presented in the mainstream media.

BSTA103 **Business Statistics**

This subject is designed to develop your ability to assess and critically interpret statistics and business information and apply them in changing business environments. The subject places strong emphasis on developing a clear and strong understanding of various analytical tools used in business. These skills and competencies provide a foundation for professional practice and for further business studies.

EFMT103 **Foundation Mathematics**

Quantitative knowledge and skills are fundamental to many disciplines and many professions. This subject aims to provide you with opportunities to acquire essential knowledge and skills in fundamental quantitative areas including basic algebra, functions, and calculus. You'll develop confidence in basic mathematics topics, ensuring a smooth and confident transition to further quantitative subjects in science and engineering.

EMAT203 **Mathematics 1**

The study of Mathematics is central to an understanding of the world around us and is fundamental to all areas of science and engineering. This subject is designed to develop your understanding of the underlying principles of mathematics and to equip you with the necessary problem-solving skills applicable for solving problems of a practical nature. The subject also provides the requisite knowledge and skills for future studies in science and engineering.

EPHY103 **Physical Modelling**

Physical Modelling lays the foundation for engineering and the physical sciences with topics that cover classical mechanics, oscillations and waves, fluids, electricity, and thermal physics. The subject explores these concepts in the context of current technology and engineering. It equips you with general knowledge and skills in physics, and, together with the practical application of this knowledge, extends your problem-solving capabilities to the physical world. The subject further introduces the experimental and measurement techniques, and data analysis methods used in engineering.

EPRO203/ IPRO203 **Programming 1**

Programming computers is an essential skill for computer scientists, software engineers, software developers and data scientists. Successful programmers integrate many diverse capabilities to be able to solve complex, abstract problems. This subject introduces the core programming concepts using an object-oriented approach to programming, prioritising project-based learning and independent research, experimentation, and communication skills. Additionally, most programming in industry occurs as alterations to a portion of a large existing codebase, and this subject introduces you to how your initial programming explorations may eventually expand to making fixes or improvements to complex industry-scale projects.

IIS103 **Introduction to Information Systems**

This subject introduces you to today's business environment and how technology is integrated into business, government, and community systems, including the trend to greater mobility, greater complexity, globalisation and business networking, and ways that technology can deliver services to improve business competitiveness in an increasingly global and networked environment. The subject introduces the role of information systems in managing businesses and the formation of business networks, and covers aspects of successful communication in a professional environment, along with different types of information systems and how they are used in organisation's activities.

The importance of stakeholders and users in information systems, systems development methodologies, collaborative work processes, teamwork, and usability evaluation are also covered. You'll undertake a detailed investigation of an information system and how the system supports the people and tasks of an organisation, and design the user interface for a simple information system. You'll use real-world case studies to understand the difference between social value, business value, and IS value and explore ethics, social responsibility, and IS sustainability topics.

INEF203 Network Fundamentals

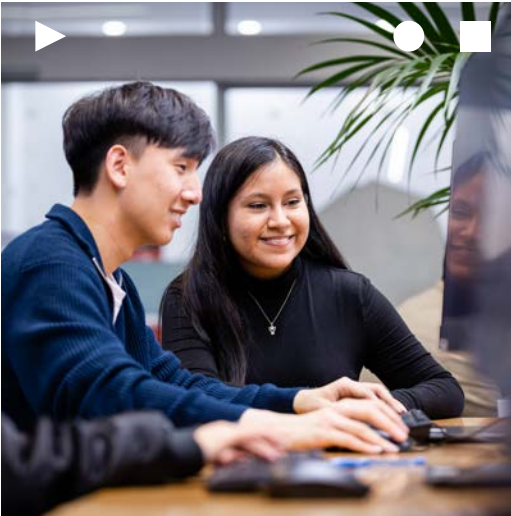
Today's internet is arguably the largest engineered system ever created by humanity, carrying petabytes of data every minute. It is important for data engineers to understand how data is transferred through the internet, and what are the guiding principles and structure of the data transport protocols. This subject provides you with a modern introduction to the dynamic field of computer networking, including layered network architecture and the TCP/IP protocol suite. Practical work includes observing network traffic in action and building your own network applications through socket programming. By developing problem-solving and design skills in this subject, you also acquire the ability to select the most appropriate network services, and design and develop network applications, e.g. web servers and email clients, to achieve the best data performance.

IWBS103 Web System

In this subject, you will develop the skills of using a computer as a tool for information processing and data transfer over the internet. The core of these activities is Unix, the operating system which supports most web applications. After understanding this operating system, you'll learn and develop the knowledge and skills to create web pages and websites. The underlying software, hardware, the principles of number systems, web services, and security principles will also be investigated.



2.3 Your learning experiences



Learning.Connected

Our learning and teaching strategies and approach for Cambridge International AS and A Levels aligns with the UTS College model of learning, [Learning.Connected](#).

Our approach to student learning design is one that integrates all aspects of the student educational experience. This approach encompasses all student academic activities before, during, and between classes, focuses on academic language and literacy, and provides opportunities to connect with other students through social and cultural activities.

Our student-centred approach to learning builds on the principles of UTS learning.futures and Canvas best practice. It also integrates UTS College student support programs, including the Peer Mentoring Program, HELPS Centre programs, English language development, and the Student Success team.

By integrating the best aspects of these programs, we can provide a deeper student learning experience and better prepare you to become an independent learner with a clear focus on your future career.

We realise that UTS College students are moving from junior secondary school learning, where students are more reliant on the teacher to give them information, to the independent learning required at senior secondary school, university, and in your future work. 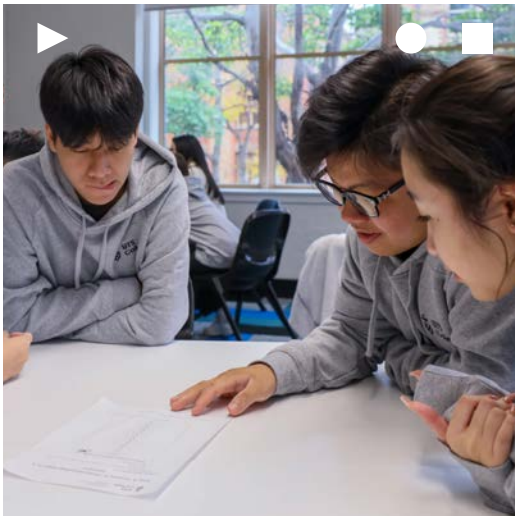


Learning Management System: Canvas

Canvas is UTS College's Learning Management System. Canvas is where you can find all your subject materials including assessments and announcements. It is also the place where you'll submit assessments, complete group work, receive grades, feedback and communicate with your teachers outside of class. Canvas makes communicating easier by sending you notifications by email or text to alert you on just about anything relating to your course, including when:

- an assignment is due
- you have received a grade and feedback from your teacher
- your teacher has made an announcement
- somebody has responded to your discussion post, and more.

2.4 Assessment



Cambridge International AS / A Level subjects

At UTS College, Cambridge International AS / A Level subjects have both internal and external assessments.

Internal assessment:

- has both formative and summative components throughout the study period
- allows for continuous evaluation, timely feedback identifying strengths and weaknesses, and preparing for the external Cambridge International AS and A exams
- has various types, including but not limited to, student presentations, laboratory reports, essays, online assessment, class quizzes and tests, reflections, practical exercises, and examinations. Please refer to the subject outlines on Canvas for the assessment details.

External assessment, in the form of exams, usually takes place in October every year.



Academic English and first-year university (diploma) subjects

Internal assessment only - please refer to the subject outlines on Canvas for assessment details.

Reporting student performance

For both internal and external assessment, grades are reported with clear guidelines to explain the standards of achievement.

- The Cambridge International A Level is reported on a grade scale from A* (highest) to E (minimum required performance).
- There is no A* grade for Cambridge International AS Levels, Academic English subjects or university subjects, which are reported from grade A to E.
- If your performance in the subject does not reach the minimum standard, you simply do not receive a grade, and the exam result of the subject will appear as 'ungraded'.
- Each subject is graded separately and no Grade Point Average (GPA) is calculated.

Your performance is reported on every semester, and you can check your results during the semester on eStudent.

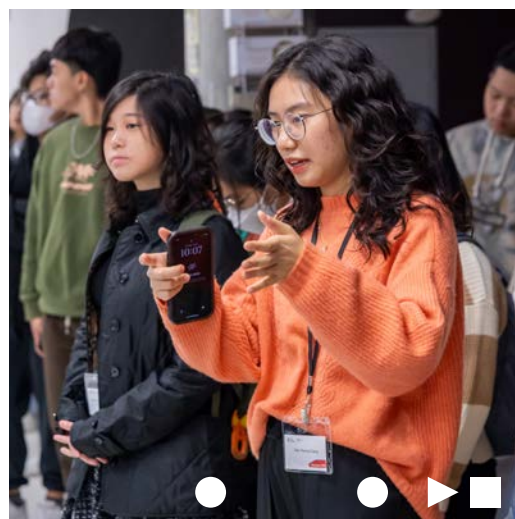

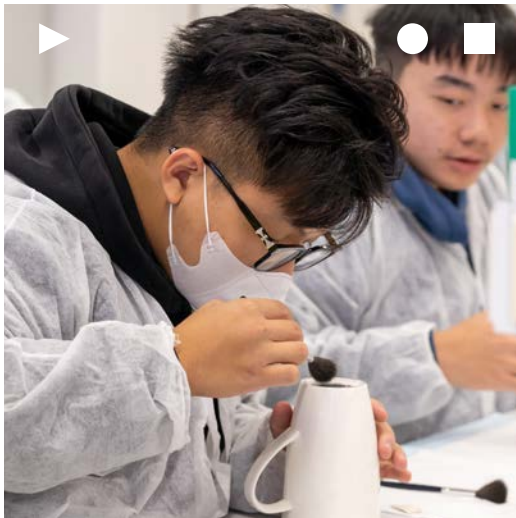

3. Course management

3.1 Attendance

You must attend all classes. Regular attendance at every class is very important for success in your studies. Students with good attendance rarely fail. Good attendance is also a student visa requirement for international students. Personal reasons such as weddings, holidays, sports, or hobbies are not acceptable reasons for missing classes.

It is also important that you arrive on time for class. Lateness to class disrupts your studies and your classmates. You must attend the specific class you have enrolled in, or you will be marked absent.

Monitoring

Your attendance is monitored from day one of Welcome Week. Attendance is taken in all classes, in all subjects, including the Duke of Edinburgh's International Award activities.

Warnings

When your projected attendance is **95% or lower**, the Compliance and Reporting Officer will send you a first warning letter, reminding you of the importance of maintaining satisfactory attendance and advising you to speak with a Student Success Adviser for support.

If your projected attendance falls **below 87%**, our Compliance and Reporting Officer will send you a second warning letter, reminding you that you are at high risk of not meeting satisfactory attendance requirements. You must schedule an appointment with a Student Success Adviser as soon as possible to receive assistance and advice.

When your projected attendance is **80% or lower**, the Compliance and Reporting Officer will send you an 'Intention to Report' (ITR) letter. The ITR letter will clearly state that you have breached your visa condition in relation to course attendance requirements under National Code Standard 8.

What to do when you cannot attend classes

If you are unable to attend classes for any reason, such as an illness, hospitalisation, accident, involvement in a police matter, family bereavement, or a family emergency, you need to contact your teacher by email (listed on your Canvas subject homepage) and the UTS College Student Centre by email StudentCentre@utscollege.edu.au.

Documentary evidence

If you are absent due to illness, you'll need a medical certificate, which should include the period of illness. A medical certificate is issued by a registered medical provider such as a hospital, doctor, dentist (emergency appointments only), psychiatrist or psychologist. Medical certificates cannot be purchased online or from friends. UTS College does not accept certificates from alternative medical practitioners such as herbal practitioners, acupuncturists, Chinese therapists, massage therapists, iridologists, psychics etc.

The medical certificate must be the original, must not be backdated, and must state the practitioner's provider number. You should present this documentation to your teachers and provide it to the UTS College Student Centre on your first day back after your absence.

For international students, UTS College is required by law to have documentary evidence of the circumstances that prevented you from attending class. Providing documentation is essential to make sure that your student visa is not cancelled. Documentation includes medical certificates, a police report or in the case of a loss in the family, a death certificate or statement from a funeral home.

Going on holidays

Holiday time is at the end of exams and over the Christmas / New Year break in December. Holiday leave is not permitted during the semester.

If you're under 18 and on the CAAW arrangement, you must discuss your plans with a Student Success Adviser and your accommodation provider if you wish to travel during recognised holiday periods. You'll need to complete the [Holiday Application Form](#), including written permission from your parent/legal guardian, and provide a copy of your flight itinerary. Leave applications must be approved by the UTS College Student Success Adviser team.

3.2 Academic progress

You're expected to maintain satisfactory academic progress and complete your course within the normal timeframe required. Satisfactory progression throughout your course is not only a UTS College requirement, but also an Australian Government requirement for international students.

If you fail your first assessment in any subject during a study period, you're considered 'at risk' of failing to meet academic course progression requirements and you will be sent an Academic Course Progress Policy (International) reminder letter. You will also need to meet with a Student Success Adviser to discuss and develop intervention strategies.

Not performing well in subjects will impact your planned articulation to degree studies. If you're struggling to meet academic progress expectations, you'll be placed on the Academic Success Program and will be contacted by a Student Success Adviser, who will offer additional support.

3.3 Re-enrolment

After your results have been released, you'll need to re-enrol on [eStudent](#) to continue with your program.

Important information such as your contact details, emergency information, student visa information, timetables, course results, fee payments, and more are stored in [eStudent](#). You need to keep these records up to date.

Before you re-enrol

When you're continuing your studies, you'll need to pay your fees for the upcoming academic semester before you can re-enrol. We will email an invoice in Week 10 for your next semester's fees. Your [fees](#) are due one week before Welcome-back Week.

When to re-enrol

You'll find key dates in the [Academic Calendar](#) and important information will be emailed to you. Please make sure you complete your re-enrolment by Wednesday of Welcome Week. If you miss online enrolment, please email enrolment@utscollege.edu.au no later than Friday of Welcome Week.

How to re-enrol

If you're a re-enrolling academic student, you'll need to enrol online at eStudent.

- Log into eStudent with your Student ID and UTS password.
- Make sure you have Zoom on your device, as it's where enrolment support sessions are held.
- View our enrolment [support session schedule](#) and join a session at a time that suits you.

If you don't re-enrol on time

As an international student, when you have not re-enrolled by the specified date, you will be reported to the Department of Home Affairs for failure to re-enrol.

3.5 Deferring or suspending your enrolment

Please contact the UTS College Student Centre and submit a formal application if you need to defer your studies. You must complete an 'Application to Defer' form, which will need to be approved by your UTS College Student Success Adviser. Prior to applying to defer your course, you must ensure that you have paid any library fines and have returned all library resources to the library and UTS College HELPS Centre.

Department of Home Affairs regulations permit deferral of studies by international students only in exceptional circumstances such as serious illness, death in the family, or for some other compassionate reason. You'll be required to provide documentation supporting your application to defer.

Grounds for deferral or suspension

You may apply to defer or suspend your studies on the grounds of compassionate or compelling circumstances. Compassionate or compelling circumstances are generally those beyond your control and which have an impact on your course progress or wellbeing. These could include, but are not limited to:

- serious illness or injury, where a medical certificate states that you were unable to attend classes
- bereavement of close family members such as parents or grandparents (where possible a death certificate should be provided)
- major political upheaval or natural disaster in your home country requiring emergency travel, which has impacted on your studies

- a traumatic experience, which could include:
 - involvement in, or witnessing of, a serious accident; or
 - witnessing, or being the victim of, a serious crime, which has impacted on you (these cases should be supported by police or psychologists' reports).
- UTS College being unable to offer a pre-requisite unit/subject, or your failure of a prerequisite unit/subject, causing a shortage of relevant units/subjects in which you are eligible to enrol.

UTS College can also defer or suspend your studies. Reasons include, but are not limited to:

- compassionate or compelling circumstances (as above)
- you refuse to maintain approved care arrangements, if you are under 18 years of age
- you are missing
- you have medical concerns, severe depression or psychological issues which lead UTS College to fear for your wellbeing
- you have engaged, or threaten to engage, in behaviour that is reasonably believed to endanger yourself or others
- You're at risk of committing a criminal offence
- you're found to have committed serious academic or non-academic misconduct; or
- you have failed to pay the required fees.

3.6 Deferring or cancelling your commencement

In certain limited circumstances, you're allowed to defer commencement (late commencement) of your studies or temporarily suspend them. This includes taking leave of absence during your course through a formal agreement with the provider. Deferral, suspension, or cancellation of enrolment may affect your student visa.

Definition of terms:

- Deferral - postponement of the commencement of enrolment
- Suspension - temporary postponement of enrolment
- Cancellation - cessation of enrolment
- Leave of Absence - a request by a student to temporarily postpone study after the commencement of the study period.

3.7 Changing your stream or program

Transfer to another UTS College Cambridge stream

If you want to change your stream, you will need to contact your teacher. Applications to transfer to another stream will be only accepted from your date of enrolment until Friday of Week 1 in the summer semester. Applications will not be accepted after Friday of Week 1.

Transfer to another UTS College course

(for example UTS Foundation Studies)

If you would like to change your course, you'll need to contact a Student Success Adviser. Transferring to another UTS College course will depend on availability and your academic progress or academic qualifications and/or English qualifications.

If you're currently enrolled in Cambridge International AS and A Levels, and have completed at least one year of the Cambridge International AS program, you may apply to transfer to another UTS College course, for example UTS Foundation Studies.

Applications to transfer to another UTS College course will be accepted from the date that results are published until the Wednesday before Week 1.

Adding or dropping a subject

You are not able to add or drop any subjects in Cambridge International AS and A Levels. You will need to study and choose subjects according to the study plan.

Extending your study

If you hold a student visa and need to extend your studies at UTS College beyond the normal or expected period of study, you'll need to speak to UTS College Student Centre staff and obtain additional visa documentation to cover the extra period of study.

3.8 Withdrawal from UTS College, cancellation of enrolment, or transfer to another education provider

Please speak to a Student Success Adviser if you decide to withdraw from your studies at UTS College. If you withdraw, you'll need to return your student card, ensure that you have paid any library fines and have returned all library resources to the UTS library or HELPS Centre. You will also be bound by the UTS College refund policy and the Terms and Conditions outlined in your offer letter.

Grounds for withdrawal

As an international student:

- you are no longer interested in studying or your personal and/or financial circumstances mean that you cannot continue with your studies, and you have decided to return overseas
- you have been granted a release by both UTS College and your principal provider to transfer to a course offered by another provider.

Cancellation of enrolment

UTS College can cancel your enrolment under certain circumstances. These include:

- if a deferral or suspension is for reasons other than compassionate and compelling circumstances due to your conduct
- the compassionate or compelling circumstances which warranted the deferral or suspension of studies cease to exist
- you provided fraudulent evidence documents to UTS College
- you're found to have committed academic or non-academic misconduct.

As an international student, your visa may be cancelled if any of the above circumstances apply.

Transfer to another education provider

As an international student:

- if you're considering changing to another educational provider, you should first speak to a Student Success Adviser and then to a UTS College Student Centre staff member. You'll need to complete an 'Application to Transfer to Another Provider' form. Documentation, including a valid offer letter from the new institution supporting your request to transfer, is required
- Department of Home Affairs regulations require UTS College approval if you're intending to enrol at another institution after withdrawing from UTS College
- Department of Home Affairs regulations will not normally permit you to change to a course of a lower Australian Qualification Framework (AQF) level. Failure to comply with immigration rules will lead to cancellation of your student visa
- in some cases, you may be required to return overseas after withdrawing
- where approval to withdraw is granted, UTS College is required to advise the Department of Home Affairs of this change in your enrolment status. If you hold a UTS package visa, you'll need to contact the UTS International office to advise them of this change in your study plans.

Transfers between registered providers – changing institutions

Guided by the National Code 2018 Standard 7, it is only possible for you to transfer from one provider (education institution) to another without approval, after completing six months of the principal course. The principal course is the main course for which your student visa was granted.

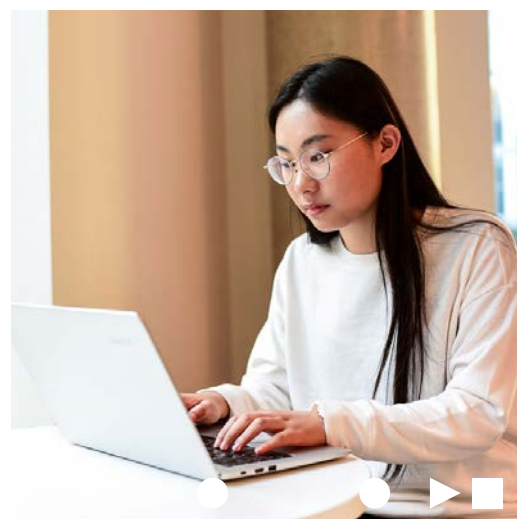
To transfer to a new provider before completing six months of study in your principal course, you must:

- obtain a release from the principal provider (and UTS where UTS College is not the principal provider), and
- obtain approval transfer from your sponsor (if you are a sponsored student).

The receiving provider (the education institution to which you wish to transfer) can only enrol you if your release has been approved in the PRISMS system and a letter of approval from your sponsor (where applicable) has been provided.

3.9 Deciding to return to your studies after having withdrawn

If you choose to resume your studies later, you'll need to complete a new application form and have this assessed before being allowed to re-enrol in your course.



3.10 Program completion

Graduation and Prize Winner Ceremony

The Graduation and Prize Winner Ceremony is an opportunity for you to celebrate the completion of your studies at UTS College with fellow students, family, and friends. It is a formal event held for you on completion of your studies. The ceremony includes the presentation of prizes and you'll be congratulated by the Vice Chancellor of UTS. An invitation to attend your graduation will be emailed to you (prize winners will also be notified by email).

Academic records

Your Academic Record will be awarded to you, via My eEquals, Australia and New Zealand's official tertiary credentials platform, when you successfully complete your program. Your Testamur (certificate) and Academic Transcript will be issued in a secure environment where you can view and share your credentials. You'll receive notification to the personal email account you supplied when registering for your program, asking you to create your My eEquals account to gain access to your Academic Record. Your qualification can easily be shared and verified by verification agencies, recruitment professionals and employers.

Articulation to a UTS College diploma and / or UTS undergraduate degree

You'll find the academic requirements to progress to your UTS or UTS College program listed in the conditions in your original UTS College offer letter.

If you satisfactorily complete Cambridge International AS and A Levels program, you'll receive an offer to your preferred degree from UTS if you meet the academic requirements. Based on your A Level results (the external assessment), an overall aggregate score will be calculated based on the best three A Level subjects where A*=6, A=5, B=4, C=3, D=2, E=1.

If you choose instead to articulate with 24 credit point to a corresponding UTS College diploma, you'll receive an offer from UTS College if you meet the academic requirements. This will be based both on your A Level results as outlined above, plus a pass grade for all diploma subjects.

Transferring to UTS

When you're in the final stage of your study at UTS College and wish to transfer to UTS, you will attend the UTS Important Information Session organised by the Student Success Advisers. Transfer sessions usually take place mid-semester of your final stage of study. You'll be provided with information regarding your chosen degree and the steps to complete for your transition to UTS. Please see your Student Success Adviser if you need further assistance.

HELPS Centre

The HELPS Centre is a safe, friendly space where you can study independently, attend workshops, and access English language and study skills resources. The HELPS Centre is located in UTS Building 5, Block C, Level 1, 1-59 Quay Street, Haymarket NSW 2000. You can email HELPS@utscollege.edu.au or come into the HELPS Centre to meet a HELPS Adviser. The HELPS Centre is open Monday-Friday, 9am to 5pm, during term time.

On-campus resources

The HELPS Centre has a wide range of resources for learning English, including grammar books, dictionaries, listening materials, and IELTS practice books. Please note that Cambridge International will not communicate directly with you. UTS College is responsible for managing Cambridge International AS and A Levels program, and its qualifications and assessments.

Contact details

It's important to keep UTS College up to date with your current contact details. You can update your contact details on [eStudent](#), or complete a Change of Contact Details form at the UTS College Student Centre.

The Department of Home Affairs requires international students to advise UTS College of any changes to your contact details within seven (7) days.

As an international student under 18 years, if you're changing your address, you'll need to contact the [UTS College Student Centre](#) to update your details. That's because UTS College is responsible for confirming that your accommodation and welfare arrangements are appropriate.

Your student ID card

You'll need to submit a photo for your UTS College Student Card when you enrol. Use your computer, tablet, or smartphone to upload your photo through the [CaptureME portal](#).

After you submit your photo, check your Student Email account regularly for an approval or rejection message.

- If you receive a rejection email, please submit a new photo that addresses the rejection criteria outlined in the email. Please don't resubmit the same photo.
- If your photo is approved, UniCard (the Student Card provider) will let you know you when your ID card is ready to collect from the UTS College Student Centre (Building 5, Block C, Level 1).

When you receive your card, please make sure to sign the grey strip on the back.

It's important to always carry this card when attending UTS College. You might be asked to produce it:

- by your teachers
- by security or administration staff
- when borrowing from the UTS Library or accessing other UTS services or facilities
- when sitting exams
- when accessing the UTS Counselling Services and UTS Health Services.

Don't forget to sign your student card, and never let others borrow it. If you lose your card, the UTS College Student Centre can arrange a replacement card for a cost of A\$30.

Canvas Parent

Canvas is our online learning management system, accessible to parents and students 24/7. Canvas Parent enhances the way parents and carers can engage with your child's education. Parents are given an observer role that enables you to:

- review your child's upcoming or past assignments
- receive alerts on your child's activities
- view ongoing teacher feedback
- view a calendar of upcoming assignments and school events; and
- communicate with your child's teacher.

Reporting to parents

UTS College uses a variety of student assessment and reporting activities to inform and support your child's learning. Assessment is a systematic process that facilitates and evaluates student learning. It includes designing, developing, and implementing assessment tasks, as well as judging and reporting on student performance and providing students with feedback on their performance.

When the semester ends, we provide students and parents with a progress report. Reporting provides comprehensive information about your child's learning and achievements for their continued improvement.

We also hold parent-teacher meetings during Welcome-back Week of each semester (Semesters 1, 2 and 3). These meetings allow your child to share their progress in the program and parents to hold a private discussion with your child's teacher via Zoom. Specific interview days or evenings are set aside for this purpose and parents can schedule an appointment using our online booking system.
